## **Beautification Committee**

We encourage all residents to participate in maintaining their property in our beautiful neighborhood in accordance with our covenants. A reminder to all residents, including renters, please keep your yards free of out-of-control weeds, grasses and construction materials. This includes the strip of your property along the alley.

After the placement of the "Please pick up your pet's poop" signs along Barstow, poop sightings are way down. Thank you, residents. It is noticed and appreciated.

During our annual meeting in March, Christee King gave a presentation (with pictures) of the condition of our streets and the city's repaving schedule reported 4 years ago. We eventually learned that the "repaving" was actually filling in the cracks. Work was completed within 3 weeks of the project's starting in July. Thank you, Christee, for your report on this matter.

The main project for 2024 was to "beautify the Racheleigh alley," which had seemingly been ignored for years and was in bad shape. Volunteers dug up weeds, invasive trees and plants all along the north wall of the alley. Thank you to residents Faith, Adeline and our president Debra (and her husband) who volunteered their time and energies this past year helping to keep our neighborhood beautiful and accessible for all residents, city trucks and first responders when needed. It took many hours of hard work and trips to the dump, but we now have an alley that everyone can travel in both directions without having to dodge tree branches, piles of leaves and holes! We then asked residents who live on Racheleigh to support the final phase of the project by cleaning up their section of property

along the alley. Thank you, Racheleigh residents, who made this incredible transformation happen. We are your friends and neighbors, so if any of you need assistance with your property or if you have any questions, please feel free to reach out to me or any ANNA officer so we can assist with resources and information.



I continue to try to find volunteer organizations that can assist our residents with lawn care. I reached out to various scout troops to see if any could volunteer their time to residents who could not perform basic lawn tasks on their own. Girl Scout Troop #10607 responded in true girl scout fashion! They came twice to help in areas that needed attention. There were at least twenty girls, brothers, mothers and fathers on the second visit. A big ANNA thank you to all those who showed up and worked so hard, and to Erin who responded to my request and co-ordinated this work with the troop. She stated they may be available again next year in the spring. We will create a signup list for residents who cannot perform basic lawn care tasks. Contact me.

Unfortunately, two trees had to be removed from the south entrance to our neighborhood: a small red tree on Parrot Run thought to be diseased but found to be infected with termites; and a mostly-dead tree on Barstow just south of the entrance that was creating a safety hazard from falling branches. They were removed on the same day and the area was cleaned and landscape returned to normal.

I look forward to next year with new ideas and the same excitement to target other areas of concern.

We have had a quiet summer in Academy North. As the seasons change and it begins to get dark earlier, please consider turning on your porch light to help light up our neighborhood. This will help to deter crime. If you experience a crime or see something out of the ordinary let me know. #### July 14, 2024:

A neighbor on Parrot Run reports that she watered her small garden in the alley on the north side of Parrot Run at about 7am on that Sunday morning. Everything was fine and the alley was quiet. Two hours later, at about 9am, she saw that one of her plants, a fuchsia pink Vinca, had been stolen right out of the ground! It wasn't an animal because nothing else was disturbed in the garden. This neighbor was so shocked that someone would actually steal a live plant right out of the dirt!

Sat, Oct 19 to Nov 2

Closest location: Holly Plaza, 6600 Holly Ave NE (north of Paseo del Norte)

Election Day: Tue, Nov 5, 7am–7pm Vote in any of 72 voting locations.

#### **Green Waste Fall Schedule:**

Fall Green Waste collection dates are not yet announced. Based on earlier years, it will be collected in the first 2 weeks of December. Green waste in tied plastic garden bags should be at the curb, 5 feet away from cans, by 7am on your regular trash collection day. Green waste is processed into a rough chip mulch and used to help prevent erosion at the Cerro Colorado Landfill.

## Help with Yard Cleanup for Seniors:

FYI: the city has a free annual yard cleanup for those 65+ years old. If you are interested, please go to cabq.gov, look under senior services, and sign up for the program.

# Recycling

#### **Home Collection:**

There is single-stream collection of paper, plastic and metal. **Paper** includes newspaper, junk mail, office paper, books, cardboard (but not pizza boxes), milk and juice boxes, brown paper bags (but not plastic bags), paper egg cartons (but not Styrofoam). **Plastic** includes rigid bottles/tubs, and rigid plastic toys, hampers, etc. **Metal** includes aluminum and tin cans, foil and pie pans, pots and pans, and small appliances.

All items to be recycled must be rinsed or wiped out. For a fuller list of accepted and not accepted items: cabq.gov/solidwaste/recycling

## **Plastic Bags:**

Plastic bags must not be placed in recycling; they can clog the sorting machines. Most supermarkets have collection bins at the entrance. Please try reusable bags.

## **Glass Recycling:**

The nearest Glass Recycling drop-off site is at the Albertsons parking lot at 8100 Ventura NE. Glass cannot be collected by overhead recycling trucks. Breaking glass contaminates the regular recycling collection.
